UMDNJ-School of Nursing and Newark Public Library co-host "Grace Before Dying" Exhibit on Prison Hospice Program Continues through Dec. 7 Closing Reception at Newark Public Library

NEWARK--Photographs by Lori Waselchuk, award-winning documentary photographer and arts activist, and quilts by incarcerated hospice volunteers at Louisiana State Penitentiary are on display in the "Grace Before Dying" traveling exhibit running through December 7 at the Newark Public Library (NPL), 5 Washington Street in Newark. The free exhibit is sponsored by the Ethics Committee of the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey (UMDNJ) School of Nursing in collaboration with the NPL.

The exhibit tells the story of prisoners in Louisiana's infamous Angola Penitentiary and how their hospice program--run by one staff nurse and a team of inmate volunteers-- is helping to transform one of the nation's most dangerous maximum security prisons into one of the least violent. In allowing inmates to comfort terminally ill fellow inmates, the program fosters a culture of humanistic respect and compassion among convicts in an environment typically focused on isolation and punishment. This ground-breaking program at Angola is also documented in the book, also entitled *Grace Before Dying*, which contains photographs by Waselchuk and essays by Lawrence N. Powell.

A Closing Reception will be held Friday, December 7 from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. at the Library and will feature a presentation and book signing by Waselchuk, with copies of the book available for sale.
