# Black History Celebration of the African Diaspora at the Newark Public Library

The Newark Public Library will present its annual Black History Celebration with a series of programs recognizing the African Diaspora. The celebration is dedicated to the memory of the late Nelson Mandela and will include African music and dance, panel discussions, films and a children's program.

Defining Moments: An exhibition of works by Bryan Collier will be on view from January 27 through April 5, 2014. Mr. Collier wrote and illustrated the Coretta Scott King Awardwinning book *Uptown*. He received Caldecott Honors for the books *Martin's Big Words* by Doreen Rappaport, which was also a Coretta Scott King Illustrator Honor book; and *Rosa* by Nikki Giovanni, which received the Coretta Scott King Illustrator Award. Watercolors and collage illustrations from these and other books will be on display on the second floor gallery of the Main Library. The exhibit was organized by the National Center for Children's Illustrated Literature, Abilene, Texas.

Funding for the Library's Black History celebration activities and exhibits has been provided by a generous grant from the PNC Foundation.
