Tips for Communication

- If you have a deaf child mainstreamed into your will benefit greatly from visual aids, visual cues... learner, even those with cochlear implants. They classroom, realize that the child is primarily a visual

Using an Interpreter

- equal access to all communication. First of all, having an interpreter does not guarantee
- Speak directly to the deaf student, not the atter class." interpreter. Use first person: "Can you see me after class?" instead of "Tell him he needs to see me
- The interpreter is not a teacher's aide or the deaf student's aide
- Remember that the Deaf child is capable. Do not limit the student in your classroom.



Identity is Important

- Use video conferencing technology to allow programs/schools for the Deaf. the deaf student to meet and interact with other deaf students and Deaf adults at large
- Google your state's Association of the Deaf visit your classroom. Let your administrator and find a local chapter. Invite Deaf adults to know that the school must provide an interpreter for you and your hearing students.



As you teach....

- Be an advocate for Deaf children and their families.
