NEW YORK — A restored and enlarged Harlem Mosque No. 7 is being built to replace the one gutted after Malcolm X was killed.

This information was given last week by Clarence 7X, circulation manager of the Muslim newspaper, Muhammad Speaks.

In addition to the religious facilities, he said, the new three-story edifice will house a school.

Clarence 7X would not divulge the total cost of the building.

The original mosque at 302 W. 138th Street was firebombed on February 25, 1965 in apparent retaliation for the assassination of Malcolm X, who had previously defected from the Muslims.

## Only few 'soul brothers' get leadership positions

DA NANG — A number of troopers with the 101st Airborne Brigade told the AFRO in Vietnam this week that, though colored servicemen comprise more than 65 percent of the unit, few colored men have been given promotions or positions of leadership and responsibility.

One of the troopers, a native of Detroit, Mich., who has earned seven medals including the Bronze Star and the Purple Heart with two clusters, was especially disturbed over the situation.

"We have several men in the 101st, and I know the same thing is true in the 173rd who are capable of leadership, but they have never been promoted or given the chance to perform."

"Every now and then they'll let someone lead a platoon, but we don't have anyone in a command position."

"The 101st is 65 percent colored and at one time the percentage in the 173rd was that high or higher. If anyone deserves credit, it is really the fellows in those two units. They have really been fighting the major battles of this war."

## NAACP to assist victims of N.J. riot

NEWARK, N.J. — The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People has retained legal counsel to assist police brutality charges stemming from the riot in the white community to arm themselves . . . for an open shooting season on colored people.

Robert L. Carter, NAACP chief legal counsel, also announced that his office would supply legal aid to at least three Newark business leaders who have accused police and National Guardsmen of wantonly spraying bullets into their businesses because they had sought to protect their establishments by "scrambling" "soul brother" on their display windows.

In an earlier development, NAACP Executive Director Roy Wilkins stated in a telegram to New Jersey Gov. Richard Hughes that remarks

made by the governor during the destructive riot had been "misinterpreted" and were being used "by elements in the white community to arm themselves . . . for an open shooting season on colored people."

While deploring the five days of violence which cost 36 lives and millions of dollars in property damage, Mr. Wilkins said that "indiscriminate state spraying of apartments with bullets to stop snipers had actually spread alarm and anger in the population."

MEANWHILE, Mrs. Irene Smith, president of the New Jersey state conference of the NAACP, and Miss Sally G. Carroll, Newark NAACP branch president, charged at a news conference here that the riots were caused by unemployment, underemployment, poor housing, educational and recreational facilities and continued refusal of public officials to listen to complaints from the community.

During the crowded news conference, NAACP trustee field director Philip Savage told reporters the NAACP is signing two college professors to prepare an independent study of Newark. What Happened Here and Why.

The NAACP officials also announced plans to launch a fund-raising drive to provide food and clothing for destitute families caught in the riot.

The first comprehensive index to literature on minority group employment, initiated and funded by the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission, will be published in August by the Institute of Labor and Industrial Relations of the University of Michigan and Wayne State University.

The 1,000-page EEOC Document and Reference Text (DART) provides direct reference to approximately 5,000 published and unpublished documents dealing with employment of minority groups and women.

The full-text keyword index will provide easy access to a wide range of literature concerning employment trends in employment, economic status, job mobility and migration patterns; the impact of automation and government, business and union policies and practices concerning minority group employment.

The EEOC's Office of Research initiated the DART earlier this year with a contract to Wayne State University.

## Davis describes air 'rescue' in Vietnam

**TAN SON KHUT** — "Dust off. Dust off," the voice crackled over the radio of air traffic controller at the Tan Son Nhut heliport.

Seconds later the radio operator shouted coordinates through a small microphone and a helicopter with the insignia of the medical corps leaped from its pad and spun off into the cloud-scattered Vietnam sky.

This is how most air evacuation rescues are made and though it may be a dramatic operation to watch, it's standard operating procedure for the men who man this busy airfield.

Keeping track of time is no problem for personnel working in base operations. They know that every 60 seconds aircraft are either taking off or landing at the facility which is one of the busiest in the world.

One minute — 60 seconds — isn't a very long period of time. To most people a minute passes unnoticed. But to the people here it has a special meaning, and often that meaning is as clear cut as the difference between life and death.

The air evacuation facility is responsible for going out to the battle field, often under attack from enemy fire, and bringing back the wounded and the dead.

THE LARGE helicopters. Hueys, have been stripped of their doors and a machine-gunner, strapped to the frame of the ship, stands at the ready on each mission of mercy.

When a unit is hit in the field and men are wounded the radio man will call the helipad and ask that "dust off choppers" be sent in.

The radio man will plot the company position and the choppers will speed to the scene in an attempt to bring the wounded back for medical treatment.

Not infrequently the choppers are shot down and sometimes they can't get through to the men.

A UNIT of the 16th Infantry Division had been on an operation for three days when it was hit by a group of North Vietnamese Regulars.

They called for dust off choppers to take out the wounded but the Hueys couldn't land because the opening in the trees was too small.

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## Black Power leaders call for a 'separate nationhood'

**NEWARK, N.J. (UPI)** — Delegates at the final session of the first national conference on black power should their approval Sunday of resolutions calling for revolutionary action to end "black bondage" in America.

Some 1,100 cheering persons, representing 190 organizations, gave their assent by acclamation to proposals for boycotting the enemies of black power; for the establishment of black nationhood; and for a drive to triple black representation in Congress.

THE FREE wheeling conference also expressed strong views on international questions, demanding the end of the Vietnam conflict; expressing solidarity with black Africans; and recommending the condemnation of "Israeli oppression against the Arabs." It also urged black youth to refuse draft for Vietnam.

It emphasized that there had been no rift "between traditional moderates" and militants in viewing the recent killings of black people in Newark by police and National Guardsmen as a public massacre.

The conference called for community colleges in all black ghettos and the amassing of capital from the black community and "the building of financial institutions."

Omari Abie Ahmed, former chief political lieutenant to the late Malcolm X, said while America had made America effectively their private domain, black Americans had no alternative but to build for black unity and a separate black nationhood.

Comedian Dick Gregory told the convention, boasters should boast the ring unless Muhammad Ali (Cassius Clay) were reinstated as heavyweight champion.

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# Carmichael to Hanoi!

LONDON (UPI) - American black power leader Stokely Carmichael left London by plane Monday on a one-way ticket to Prague with the intention of going to Hanoi.

Carmichael, 25, flew out while Southern Railway branch detectives were in the process of drawing up a report his activities in England for Home Secretary Roy Jenkins, who has the power to ban foreign nationals from Britain.

Defendants have been taking short-hand notes at public talks on "black power" during the last few days.

ONE NATIONAL newspaper, the Daily Sketch, demanded the government explain why Carmichael was allowed into Britain. It said he should have been expelled under the race laws.

Carmichael had been expected to give several more talks but left London early this morning without prior announcement. The airline he used, Air India, said he had a one-way ticket to Prague. He was accompanied by three other persons.

A spokesman at the center where Carmichael was given talks said he intended to go to Hanoi.

The spokesman did not give the reason for his departure or other information about his future plans.

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## Power delegates pass 100 resolves

The first National Black Power Conference wound up Monday with a warning that America's non-white people are being pushed into separatism by the nation's "racist-white culture."

A new conference at which nearly 100 resolutions were discussed, was the final event of a four-day rally which ended officially Sunday.

The 94 delegates were reported to have pledged their loyalty to blacks who have "rebelled" in Newark, New York's Harlem, Plainfield, N.J., Detroit and other cities. They demanded a federal guaranteed annual wage for black people who are impelled to disrupt the economy of the country.

DR. NATIA WRIGHT, conference chairman and an official of the Episcopal Diocese of Newark, told white reporters it would be permitted to cover anything related to Black Power conferences. He called the ban an "historic occasion."

The business sessions of the conference were closed to white newsmen, who were allowed to attend only in the press conference summations. The policy was permitted as the result of pressure from Black Power conferences. He called the ban an "historic occasion."

The amount of the guaranteed annual wage for blacks was not stated in the resolution, which was one of several designed to end non-white economic.

Other resolutions dealt with political and educational empowerment and non-injured international events by demanding the death penalty for former Communist Premier Joseph Stalin, for being a traitor to black people throughout the world.

Wright reported that the delegates urged the creation of black credit unions and a black economic fund. A \$1 million contribution from the delegates to the fund was agreed to see that blacks get a fair shake from Congress.

THE CONFERENCE voted to hold a national "giant rally" political convention following the two major conventions next year and in the temporary Order as the major theme by George S. Pious.

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## Newark plans probe

NEWARK, N.J. (UPI) — Two Newark congressmen have agreed to try to arrange a federal investigation into charges that Newark city workers helped rioters in this city.

The congressmen, Pat Rosten Jr. and Joseph G. Minich, both Democrats, joined in a demand for the investigation Monday by Mayor Hugh J. Addonizio and Newark Anti-Poverty Council.

The four agreed, after a City Hall meeting, that such a probe-investigation, would help "clear the air," Rosten and Minich said. The Office of Civic Opportunity (OEO) or Congress should undertake the probe.

ADDONIZIO has charged that anti-poverty workers had inflammatory statements prior to the riots that contributed to racial unrest. He said Monday he would personally urge Sargent Shriver, director of the OEO, to send a team to Newark to investigate the charges.

Still said he welcomed the investigation, which he said would clear the agency of the charges. He said the investigation was caused by brutality of the part of Newark police.
